<b>Problematic Verbs</b>
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*The following list contains some verbs that should be avoided.*

- The first list contains weak verbs which are not always clear or active enough for setting goals for the Underlying Problem.
- The second list contains absolute verbs, which are a set-up for failure in Step 3.
- Underlying Problems which contain an absolute verb can score no higher than 3 on Focus and Adequacy.
- Placing one of the weak verbs before any of the absolute verbs as helping verbs does not keep the Key Verb Phrase from being designated “absolute.”
